New Year

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Things beyond our seeing, things beyond our hearing, things beyond our imagining, have all been prepared by God for those who love him.

1 Corinthians 2:9

Tis the season of The Nativity! When my daughter was about 4, she was very excited at the prospect of being an angel in the Sunday school production of the Christmas Story. Her favourite song at the time was 'Little Donkey'

..... unfortunately for us, the two-word title were the only words that she could remember from the song that she bellowed out whenever she was reminded of her upcoming stage role. Since then, there have been nearly 35 nativity seasons, and as I prepare Christmas messages, I am paralysed by the challenge to present the same familiar story in a new and dynamic way. I, like many, are guilty of going into autopilot when we think of the Christmas Story, or indeed when we think about our faith in Jesus. We have seen or read it so many times that we are convinced that there is nothing new for us to discover.

A simple example of what I am trying to say is illustrated at the top of this article, the donkey illustrating the story about my daughter. But did you notice the seal? (If you didn't see the seal, look first to the bottom left of the picture and think 'seal face'.) We can walk around never noticing things are there in plain sight, truths 'beyond our seeing'.

What if we were to read the Christmas story in the Gospel of Luke and let the details of the narrative unfold with fresh eyes. Consider the journey of the shepherds, their simple and humble occupation, and the glorious announcement made to them by the heavenly hosts. Reflect on the significance of the star guiding the wise men, leading them to the newborn King. To imagine the familiar figures of Mary, Joseph, and the baby Jesus but taking notice of the humility in Mary's eyes and the awe in Joseph's expression. Imagine the miracle of the incarnation, the divine becoming human to dwell among us. Love that came down at Christmas.

As we notice God who is love in the familiar, perhaps we can have our eyes opened to the opportunities that God gives us to share 'Good News' and to be 'Good News'? Take a moment to notice the people around you, those who may be feeling lonely or forgotten during this season. Reach out with kindness and compassion, embodying the spirit of love that Christmas represents. In these moments, you may find yourself saying, "I never noticed the depth of human connection and the power of simple acts of kindness until now."

Amid exchanging gifts and savouring festive meals, let us not overlook the greatest gift of all, the birth of our Savior, Jesus Christ. Let us notice again or perhaps for the first time, this extraordinary gift, realizing that it is not just a historical event but a personal invitation to experience God's love and redemption.

Let this season be a time of reflection, revelation, and renewal as we embrace the true meaning of Christmas.

Palestine – an area/territory in the Middle East which has never been a recognised country or a self-governing state.

In response to a question raised by somebody in church, I thought that it would be worth exploring what Palestine is or isn't – peoples conceptions vary considerably.

Map 1 below - Judea in Jesus time.



After the Jewish revolt in AD71 the Roman Emperor, Titus destroyed the Jewish Temple, destroyed the Jewish genealogical records, and completely flattened Jerusalem. In a further attempt to wipe out any trace/memory of the State of Judea – the Romans renamed the area "Palestine" – meaning land of the Philistines.

For the next 1400 years the area designated Palestine was taken over and ruled by various empires – it was never an independent or self-governing state. In 1517, Palestine became part of the Ottoman empire.

The Ottomans chose to raise monies by putting a tax on live trees, so throughout their 400-year rule of Palestine the area became virtually a wasteland: 90% of the area was uninhabitable – desert & swampland. The American author Mark Twain visited Palestine in the 1830's and described the desolation in letters home to his friends.

In the 1840's – Jews across Europe started to yearn for their own homeland. European Jews emigrated to Jerusalem and the surrounding areas. Jews purchased land from the Arabs – land that was totally unproductive - and the new owners set about draining swamps and planting trees.

Other Jews established manufacturing industries – mostly around Tel Aviv.

Arabs from all over the Middle East came to work in these factories and established their own communities around these manufacturing hubs.


In 1917 the Turks (who had allied with Germany) were defeated, and Britain took over the mandate for the whole of Palestine.

Map 2 (top right) shows the whole area of Palestine.



After WW1 in 1921, The league of Nations passed a resolution to create a Jewish state in Palestine. This is 28 years before the start of WW2 and 33 years before the unfolding of the Holocaust. In response to this resolution, in 1922 the British ceded 72% of the Palestine territory to Jordan: They renamed that 72% of Palestine - Transjordan.

Map 3 below



All Jews living in the newly designated "Transjordan" were forcibly moved to the "Jewish" area – which still retained the name Palestine. Arabs were encouraged to move into the designated Jewish area too. Since 1948, the area of Transjordan is simply part of the one country map for Jordan.

Hamas and other Islamic groups, choose to use map 3 to support the idea that the modern State of Israel is historically "Palestine" whereas in reality, the State of Israel covers less than a third of the territory that for 1,900 years was identified as Palestine.

Jordan has never been under any pressure to create a Palestinian state within the 70% of the territory ceded to them in 1922.

FROM THE SECRETARY

Our recent application for a mission grant from Mersey Synod for our Christmas Gift bags was successful and in December we will be we hanging the bags on the gates to the graveyard for visitors to take home. There are bags for both children and adults. We know that parents from the local school use the car park when dropping off children and collecting them and a number of people visit the graveyard to lay flowers on relative's graves at this time of year. It is mainly these people who take the bags but if you know of someone who may appreciate the offer, please take a bag for them. We hang these bags to encourage people to remember the true message of Christmas. Please pray that these bags may help people to think more deeply about the gift of Jesus.

The mission grant has also provided funding for us to buy the Bible Society children's booklet about the Christmas story. These will be handed out to the Brownies after the nativity. Unfortunately, the Beavers and Cubs are unable to join us this year, but we will be passing spare copies on to them. The Nativity and Gift Service will be held on Sunday 10th December, and we will be collecting gifts for children and young people who are spending their first Christmas in their own home. These will be passed on to the Salvation Army for distribution to families around Winsford and the local area. The Salvation Army also makes hampers for distribution at Christmas time and are always grateful for gifts of food, especially Christmas food and confectionery, to include in them. If you wish to donate food, you can take it to the Salvation Army in Gladstone Street on Friday mornings between 9.30am and 3.00pm.

Our other Christmas services are the Lessons & Carols service on Sunday 17th December which will be led by Mrs Simone Burrows and the Christmas Eve service on Sunday 24th December led by Rev Dr Jan Berry. All services start at 10.30am.

Garry is leading four **Advent Fellowship Groups on Wednesdays commencing on 29**th **November at 7.30pm** in the Lecture Room. We will be looking at the Songs of Advent, Zachariah, Angels, Mary and Simeon.

Lesley, Sandra and Fiona will be organising a Beetle Drive on Saturday 9th December commencing at 2.00pm. This will be a chance to meet together socially before Christmas and enjoy fellowship. Whilst not an activity which concerns many people, High Street School will be visiting us for their Christmas services during the first week of December. This year for the first time they will be holding 3 services with three different classes each taking the lead. Garry will be attending each service and a group of people have offered to help with this to operate the sound desk and welcome the school for both the services and the rehearsals. The services are always well supported by the families and friends of the children. Please pray that those attending the services will take time to think about the birth of Jesus and what we are truly celebrating at Christmas.

The Very Green Grocery

Did you know that here in Winsford we are privileged to have our very own Community Grocery? One of its aims is to prevent food waste going into landfill thereby producing methane. Many supermarkets pay to dispose of food – some of it with sell by dates in 2024 – because they need the shelves for the next seasonal produce. Of course, they also need to dispose of produce with very close sell by dates - this food would be unacceptable at a food bank. As with many new ventures, it is only able to function because of the time given by volunteers many of them pensioners. Housed at the old job centre near the library the Grocery is open twice a week, but the building holds many other community-help groups which are open every weekday. A daily cafe is opening some time in November.

I don't know all the ins and outs of the system but gather it is now run by Changing Lives Together.

Practicalities of using the Grocery:

Nearby parking is often full.

You must take a ticket and wait for your number to be called (often over 10 minutes)
Everyone qualifies and is made welcome.
You pay £5 – I think you must register on the first visit. There are about 6 different people who tell you what you can take - one item from this shelf / 4 from this shelf / one item from this chest freezer etc. You can't go with a shopping list as each week there are different donations therefore different items on offer.
I have been offered 4 large bunches of bananas /

I have been offered 4 large bunches of bananas / 30 eggs / 2 packets of Weetabix / several loaves on different visits. You must be quick to think "what can I use /share with neighbours "and to say "no, thank you, I can't use that this week". Depending on what you accept the total value of goods is probably £30+ but the main aims are to prevent useable food going into landfill and to help those that need food to obtain it at a bargain price.

I have had Waitrose small potatoes; Greggs tuna panini (eat by today); large tin of grapefruit segments; Morrisons yoghurt; frozen mince; coconut water; beautiful mushrooms – well in date; parsnips; apples and oranges; chocolate dated 2024; frozen venison liver; frozen smoked

mackerel; large pot of single cream; beautiful pastries......and on exit you can often choose a lovely bunch of flowers – mine lasted for 10 days. Jeff says that we are widening our food horizons (easy to do as having a pizza is different for us!)

Look it up on the computer and if you know people who need this facility then tell them or take them; if you bake for church events then go and get your eggs (seem to be available every week); go yourself and help prevent landfill – if you feel diffident about it then "pay it forward" so someone else does not have to pay the £5 or you could give the money you have saved to a food bank or you could go and volunteer a couple of hours a week. This is OUR local community and Over URC's mission statement includes the words "we are hereto. love and serve the community....."



SYNOD REPORT

Mersey Synod met on 14th October 2023 at Heswall URC. For those readers who are uncertain about the role of Synod, I thought I would provide some background information. Church House in London is the Headquarters of the United Reformed Church and the central office. England, Scotland and Wales are divided into 13 Synods, and we are part of the Mersey Synod. The ministers and local churches are all part of Synod and the office which organises the day-to-day administration for our area is based in Liverpool. Mersey Synod is the smallest Synod in the UK and has a selection of full time and part time staff. It is headed by the Moderator, Rev Geoff Felton who chairs the Synod meetings and some of the Committee meetings as well. In other words, Synod is the link between the head office and the local churches. There are two main meetings a year, one in March and one in October, and anyone can attend these meetings. Synod have a website which includes many helpful leaflets and documents offering guidance on running a church, everything from buildings and maintenance to membership and the role of Elders, and many other aspects of church life.

The Synod theme this year and next is Talking Faith and this was the focus of the October meeting. A small

group of us from Over attended; Garry, Simone, Lesley, and myself. Simone has this year completed the URC Stepwise training course for Lay Preaching and was presented with flowers for her achievement. Congratulations Simone. Rev Mike Walsh from Northwestern Synod presented the Bible study explaining by reference to Jesus meeting with the woman at the well (John 4) how he ministers in the community without a church in which to base his mission. In other words, his work relates wholly to "talking church" every day in the community. The focus of the day was four workshop session and each participant had chance to attend two. Sue Richardson gave an excellent presentation about the work the Church Action for Tax Justice explaining how the inequalities in the tax system in this country exaggerate poverty. Another workshop discussed the use of small groups in churches and the opportunities they provide to deepen our faith and support each other. Other workshops included Talking Friendships and Talking Wellbeing. The aim of the workshops was to enable us to think about being church seven days a week and not just on Sunday.

We heard reports of various activities being carried out in the Synod including the new Synod website and community projects. A summary of the annual safeguarding returns was also presented. During the meeting there was mention of the Synod Mission Grants available which we have benefitted from

last year and this. Synod meetings have changed recently, whereas they used to be focussed on the agenda there is now more emphasis on welcoming all regular worshippers to participate in the meetings, connect with the wider church, share ideas and benefit from each other's experiences. Reports are still considered in the meetings and business conducted however my favourite time is the opening worship, always inspirational and enlightening. The next Synod meeting will be Saturday 9th March at Trinity URC Wigan and I would encourage people to think about attending.
